

The YP's Forum is for young people who have at some point had support from Camden's social workers and who want to give their views and make decisions about how to improve social services for young people.

What have we done since the last issue?

These are some of the things **young people have been involved in** since the last issue of Back Chat in Summer 2009:

Training social workers, managers and foster carers in Total Respect to help them understand sessions about the importance of listening to young people's views when making plans that affect their lives. This training programme is a fantastic opportunity for young people to develop confidence, presentation and training skills. It is an ongoing programme of training with four one day sessions each year.

Celebrating Achievements of children and young people in care event in November 2009 at the Holiday Inn in Camden Lock. Young people were involved in preparing a performance of their own songs, and showing a DVD to guests at the event about their experience of the 16+ service and other aspects of being in care.

Attending the Associate Parliamentary Group debate with the Government representative at Westminster. Young people gave their views about the Social Work Task Force recommendations on improving the support social workers

receive to help them give a better service to young people. Young people were also invited to Xmas lunch at **Westminster** and met John Bercow, the Speaker of the Houses of Parliament.

Organising the London Pledge consultations jointly with the Care Matters Partnership. Two consultation events were held for children aged 6-11 at London Zoo in April and young people age12-21 at the Roundhouse in June. The aim of the consultations was to get young peoples' views on the London Pledge and to select the main areas to be included in the Camden Pledge for children and young people in care.

Meeting with Young Evaluators from the Family Group Conference Service to exchange ideas about ways of involving young people in improving the service.

Helping to design a poster to advertise Camden's Safeguarding Children

Board (CSCB) website. Young people made decisions about what information to include in the poster and what colour scheme and pictures would be most catchy to attract young people's attention to the message. It was important to get it right as the poster will be displayed in all public places in Camden including schools and libraries.

When I first went into care I was 14; I was rebellious and didn't want to do anything with my life. I wasn't going to school and was always getting reported missing. There were times when I wanted to make something better of myself but I was always convinced not to by friends.

My life started to change when I was introduced to Vanessa, the Service User Participation Officer at St Christopher's. Vanessa's role was to get young people involved in decision making.

As well as getting back to college, I started voluntary work as an assistant of the Participation Officer and was helping to set up and run a radio station at the residential home to give young people a voice.

I also went on Participation and Voices training with the Care Matters Partnership (CMP). The training helps young people gain confidence; be able to talk to people in a professional way and learn how to manage tricky situations.

As result of doing the training I was offered a work experience with CMP. I jumped at the opportunity! I worked together with the team to prepare for the National Leaving Care Conference in October 2009. I was treated like a successful young person.

I am now employed by the Care Matters Partnership. This is best thing that ever happened to me. I feel like I had made a massive accomplishment with my life.

In my eyes, participation is the way forward for young people. It shows them that there are always better ways of handling situations that may get them into trouble.


Participation and Voices training for young people - coming to Camden in 2010
